HFH has grown to include unaccompanied young adults ages 18-24 and now provides 37 housing units from Emergency Shelter through affordable housing.

Harford Family House, Inc. is committed to building the start-to-finish solution to end homelessness for families with children and unaccompanied young adults in Harford County.

Who We Serve

- Families with children under the age of 18 who are experiencing homelessness and in need of emergency housing
- Families with children under the age of 18 who are experiencing homelessness where one family member has a diagnosed disability
- Young adults ages 18 to 21 who have been a part of the foster care system
- Young adults ages 18 to 24 who are experiencing homelessness and are in need of emergency housing

What We Do

- Quickly provide shelter to clients referred to Harford Family House by the Community Action Agency
- Build supportive, client-centered relationships with all residents in order to assess their needs and develop individualized action plans
- Provide individualized case management and program supports for each client from the time they enter the program until a minimum of 2 years after they move on to permanent housing
- Provide age appropriate program supports to include: after school activities, summer camp, wellness and mental health events and educational activities
- Provide transportation to help family members sustain employment and pursue car ownership opportunities
- Focus on the development of skills needed to create and support sustained independence, both through programs provided by Harford Family House and through referrals to partner agencies
